ST. HELENA HISTORICAL SOCIETY'S ANTIQUE SHOW

A child's miniature sewing machine, a newspaper clipping from the 1700s, ivory carvings, and an old mandolin were some of the fascinating family treasures brought to the St. Helena Historical Society's Antique Show on Feb 18. Informal evaluations by dealers and appraisers gave the owners of these items new information about their

treasure. Nancy Eckland, a certified appraiser with wide expertise, stayed busy throughout the day.

Antiques and collectibles were also available for purchase. Dealers brought dolls, glassware, silver, prints, furniture, jewelry and porcelain antiques to sell. Paula Huber, the Doll Lady, brought beautiful examples of dolls made of porcelain, leather, cloth and composition. While Paula evaluated many vintage dolls, a Kewpie doll brought smiles from all. Silverado Antique Center had a large double space with a wide array of interesting items, including glassware and collectibles. Elizabeth Heidt from Maxwell Silver Merchants brought striking silver antiques to sell. Gail Gum from Vintage Vogue wore a glitzy orange sequin jacket from her shop in Calistoga. Kernberger Collectibles had a large selection of Viewmasters and the picture wheels to go in them for sale.

More than 70 lots of antiques and collectibles were in the silent auction to benefit the Society. Items included books, kitchen utensils and cookbooks, vintage photos, decorator items and wine. Bidders went home with treasures and supported the efforts of the Society to preserve local history. Special thanks to the many members who donated items for the silent auction.

Over 30 Society volunteers worked to make the event a success. Thanks to everyone who helped and to Roberta Oswald, who coordinated the volunteers. She holds both a BA and an MA Degree in Clothing and Textiles from San Jose State and San Francisco State Universities. She has collected and preserved her own textiles and vintage clothing, dating from the 1700's to contemporary, and consulted for many other collectors during her career. 
