


THE STAR AT 150 YEARS

Four former and one current Star editors shared stories about working for a small-town newspaper.


While new distribution channels keep popping up, St. Helenans still look forward to their weekly Star.
















CITY OF IMMIGRANTS EXHIBIT

Mark your calendar for next year's event: July 26, 2025. Share a glass of wine and dinner with your neighbors and support the preservation of the St. Helena area's rich history.








SPIRITS OF ST. HELENA CEMETERY DISCOVERY WALK






The Bear Flag Rebellion. Pioneer families had endured long, dangerous journeys to get to California and were ready to fight the Mexican government to stay here. The men sneaked into Sonoma to capture General Vallejo in what became known as the "Bear Flag Revolt", declaring the California Republic.
